I guess that there are names that are trendy and popular and these are chosen by some, whereas others stick to traditional names that have been used for generations.




I'm not entirely sure = I don't know

to take someone's name = to stop using your name and start using their name e.g. Rebecca Smith changes to Rebecca Park
