
## > Cue Card

## **Please Note:**

Our model answers teach you useful language and give you ideas. However, it is not a good idea to try and memorise them and repeat them in the IELTS exam.

If you pop in to see somebody, you visit them in their home for a short period of time

We use between you and me to introduce information which we wouldn't want everyone to hear

A dilapidated building is in a very poor state/condition

If you replace windows, you take the old ones out and put new ones in
