


Describe a photo you took that you are proud of

#### **Please Note:**

Our model answers teach you useful language and give you ideas. However, it is not a good idea to try and memorise them and repeat them in the IELTS exam.

We use by any stretch of the imagination to emphasize a negative statement

to possess = to have; to own

If something such as a photo brings back fond memories, it helps you to remember happy times

Things which can be seen behind the main focus of a photo are called the background
